
Warp Painting

Williamsburg Spinners & Weavers is Offering

A Hands-on Weaving Workshop with Su Butler June 25 - 27, 2013 in Williamsburg, VA







An overview of color theory, mostly discussion of the value scale and application to dyeing and color mixing, begins this workshop. Students then learn to mix chemical water and dye stocks from powdered dyes. Different application techniques will be taught, and both steaming and batching of dyed warps will be utilized. Students will receive detailed handouts so they can duplicate their experience at home. At least 6 warps will be painted. Instruction will include resist methods, surface design techniques, discharge, overdyeing and hand manipulated techniques. In addition to protein and cellulose fibers, experimentation will be done with blends. We will cover dyeing in color gradations, and students will do some sample yarn dyeing to create a notebook of dye recipes to use in future.

Level: Beginner and Beyond

Class Fee: \$185 Members/\$200 Non-members, plus Materials Fee \$30 Class is limited to 14 students, and a deposit of \$100 will be required to hold a spot in the class. Deposits are non-refundable unless your class space is filled.

Class size is limited and registration will close May 5th!

Recommended dye books are: A Dyer's Garden by Rita Buchanan (in guild library) *Wild Color by Jenny Dean, revised ed. In print. Amazon \$15.93

Dye plants easily grown in Virginia gardens:

Coreopsis tinctoria or other varieties (orange - gold) Cosmos sulphureus, the yellow/orange variety Dahlia fresh or dried (copper) Queen Anne's Lace (greenish yellow) Eucalyptus (orange) Hardy hibiscus, dark red or deep pink flowers Black walnut hulls (brown) Ferns (yellow-green) *Weld (brilliant yellow) Rhubarb roots (orange) Blackberry leaves and berries (grey, grayish lavender) Coneflower, Black-Eyed Susan Goldenrod (gold) Comfrey (light olive green) Tansy (gold) Pokeberry (purple) Special procedure required, check with me for recipie. French marigold tagetes. (Yellow-gold) Dark red, purple coleus (mauve)

Place large amount of dried material (1 oz. per 1 oz. of fiber is not too much!) in 2-3 gallons of water. Bring to a simmer (don't boil) and heat for 30-40 min, stirring. Let sit overnight to cool, Strain and pour into

Preparing fiber, wool is the best to start with. Make 2-4 oz. skeins. Wash well, rinse.

**Mordant : dissolve in cup of hot water and then add to 3-4 gallons of cool water

Aluminum potassium sulfate, an 8% solution, i.e. 8g per 100g or fiber or 1 % tsp per 4 oz (100 g.) of ber, and

Cream of tatar, 7% solution, i.e. 7 g. per 100 g of fiber, or 1 ½ tsp per 4 oz (100 g) of fiber. Add wet fibers, bring to simmer, simmer for one hour, remove from heat and let cool overnight.

Pour out mordanting liquid, add concentrated dye liquid to pot, add more water to get 3-4 gallons, and bring to simmer. Add one or two skeins of fiber and simmer until desired shade is obtained. Remove fiber, let cool for a few minutes, rinse in cool water. You'll lose some of the color intensity, so you may want to return it to dye pot for another bath.
