Rusting Fabric

Prewash Your Silk (Dharma Trading Co. recommendation):

Pre-wash your silk by hand or in the washing machine on a gentle cycle with warm water and <u>Synthrapol</u>. Rinse, dry and, when still slightly damp, press with an iron set to the silk setting.

Materials:

Natural fabric (silk, cotton or linen) White vinegar Rusted objects Plastic wrap Water Salt

Procedure:

- 1. Wet the fabric with white vinegar and then wring it out so it is not dripping.
- 2. Wrap rusty objects in your fabric, drape the wet fabric over a rusty object or arrange rusty objects on top of your fabric. (In the workshop, we arranged objects down half the length of the scarf, then folded the empty half over the objects sandwiching the rusty objects between two halves of the scarf). You want to ensure close contact between the fabric and rusty object(s).
- 3. Wrap in plastic wrap to keep the fabric moist. Typically, the longer the fabric stays damp, the richer the color and the more distinct the images will be. (Let it sit overnight.)
- 4. Rinse and then soak the fabric in a gallon of water with 1 tablespoon of salt for several hours.
- 5. Wash it in hot water using regular laundry detergent. It can be ironed dry or run through the dryer.
