Minutes for March 21, 2022 Meeting

Programs for this year:

<u>April 18</u>: JCC Rec Center or zoom. Best ideas and tips from our marvelous members. Bring your favorite ideas for weaving or spinning, knitting or crocheting, felting or other fiber arts to share with everyone. Visuals are good!! Roundtable discussion of all sorts of great ideas.

May 16: King of Glory Lutheran Church and Zoom link. Double weave - doubling the width of your loom. Presented by Sandi P. Sandi is going to show us how to weave a fabric in 2 layers so the piece will come off the loom and open up like a book. This technique very effectively doubles the width of the loom. Sandi will be demoing on a multishaft table loom and will be using Jennifer Moore's helpful ideas from her Double weave book. While there are many ways to weave Double weave and many different results (pockets, tubes, patterns, etc.) Sandi will be focusing on just the double width technique. Cindy F will show how to do a similar technique on a rigid heddle loom after Sandi shows us on a multishaft loom.

<u>June 20:</u> King of Glory Lutheran Church and zoom. Josephine Estes Miniature Overshot sample exchange. The JEMO Study Group has been weaving away on our samples for the group. We have 21 members between the Williamsburg Guild and the Tavern Guild in Heathsville. The group will be doing our samples exchange and talking about what we learned over the course of weaving. What worked, what didn't and generally sharing what we did. For those not participating, please bring something to work on and enjoy the stories.

<u>July 18:</u> King of Glory Lutheran Church - for a workday only. Lots of people plan on attending Convergence in Knoxville this week, so lots of members will not be attending. But for those of us staying here, we will get together and visit with each other, bring something to work on.

<u>August 15:</u> King of Glory Lutheran Church or zoom. Direct warping of a rigid heddle loom - presented by Cindy F. She will be warping for scrub cloths for dishwashing. Demo will include warping by the direct method (on the loom) plus a bit of texture weave with a pick-up stick - and her favorite pattern for scrubbing pots! September 19: JCC Rec Center or zoom. Pimp your Bags. Bring the bags or pockets you use for your spinning wheel, loom, or other fiber arts. Wall pockets? Bench pockets? Wheel pockets? Show us how you keep track of your tools that tend to wander off. This will be a member roundtable with guidance from Cindy F.

October 17: JCC Rec center or zoom. Triangle loom weaving with Kathy K.

November 21: JCC Rec Center or zoom. Name Drafting with Ingrid.

December 19: JCC Rec Center. Challenge and potluck lunch. This year's challenge is to make a set of Holiday cards using your favorite fiber technique(s). So maybe a card with some weaving, or some gorgeous yarn, or felting or weaving. More clarification in the April meeting.

<u>The March Program</u>: March 22, JCC Rec Center or zoom link. Cindy brought her warped loom for anyone wanting to try Overshot. The program consisted of the MAFA sponsored roundtable video Linen: From seed to Cloth. This was a fascinating program documenting the amount of work that goes into growing flax, then turning it into a yarn to be woven. If you haven't watched it the link is below.
